1 SUMMARY

Finds a **cubic spline approximation to a given smooth function** f(x) within a prescribed accuracy ε , i.e. finds a cubic spline S(x) with knots ξ_i *i*=1,2,...,*n* such that

 $|S(x) - f(x)| \le \varepsilon \quad a \le x \le b$

The method is given in M.J.D. Powell, AERE R.7308.

The user must provide a subroutine to evaluate f(x) in the range $a \le x \le b$. The spline, which is returned in terms of the knots, the function values and first derivative values at the knots, interpolates f(x) at the knots. The accuracy bound ε may optionally be applied to relative accuracy.

2 HOW TO USE THE PACKAGE

2.1 Argument List (absolute accuracy)

The single precision version

```
CALL TSO1A(A, B, ACC, MAXFUN, N, XN, FN, GN, IPRINT, W, CALCFX)
```

The double precision version

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CALL TS01AD(A, B, ACC, MAXFUN, N, XN, FN, GN, IPRINT, W, CALCFX)
```

- A is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) variable which must be set by the user to the lower limit a of the range of x of the required approximation of f(x). The argument is not changed by the subroutine.
- B is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) variable which must be set by the user to the upper limit b of the range of x of the required approximation of f(x). The argument is not changed by the subroutine.
- ACC is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) variable which must be set by the user to the bound ε on the required absolute accuracy of the computed approximation. The subroutine changes the value of ACC to be the predicted accuracy in the approximation.
- MAXFUN is an INTEGER variable which must be set by the user to an upper limit on the number of times TS01 may call for values of f(x). However, in order to provide an approximation, at least 13 values of f(x) are always used. If the final spline is not sufficiently accurate due to the value of MAXFUN, a diagnostic message is printed. This case can be recognised automatically because the final value of ACC will be greater than the original ε . The argument MAXFUN is not altered by the subroutine.
- N is an INTEGER variable which must be set by the user. It serves two purposes. First it regulates the number of knots of the first trial spline approximation. Specifically, for the first iteration of the algorithm a trial spline is used that has max(9,N) equally spaced knots, unless this number is constrained by MAXFUN. Because it is usually adequate to begin by dividing the range [a,b] into eight segments, we recommend that the user sets N=0. The second purpose of N is that when the subroutine finishes, the value of N will be changed to the number of knots of the final spline approximation.
- XN is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) array of length at least MAXFUN which is set by the subroutine to the final knot values ξ_i , *i*=1,2,...,*n*. Note that $\xi_1 = a$ and $\xi_n = b$.
- FN is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) array of length at least MAXFUN which is set by the subroutine to the final values of the spline approximation $S(\xi_i)$ at the knots ξ_i , i=1,2,...,n.

- GN is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) array of length at least MAXFUN which is set by the subroutine to the final values of the spline derivative $S'(\xi_i)$ at the knots ξ_i , i=1,2,...,n.
- IPRINT is an INTEGER variable which must be set by the user to control the printing from TSO1A/AD. If IPRINT \leq 0 then no spline approximations will be printed, if IPRINT \geq 2 then only the final spline approximation will be printed, but if IPRINT=1 then the spline approximation at every iteration of the algorithm will be printed. The printing will include estimates of the error f(x)-S(x), which are particularly useful if there is any difficulty in achieving the required accuracy. If the printed error estimates seem to be irregular then the inexperienced user should seek expert advice. This argument is not altered by the subroutine.
- W is a REAL (DOUBLE PRECISION in the D version) array of length at least 1.25*MAXFUN which is used by the subroutine as workspace.
- CALCFX is the name of a subroutine which the user must provide to calculate values of the function f(x) in the range $a \le x \le b$. The name should be declared EXTERNAL in the calling program and the subroutine should take the form

SUBROUTINE CALCFX(X,F)

The single precision version

SUBROUTINE CALCFX(X,F) DOUBLE PRECISION X,F

The subroutine must set F to the value of f(x) evaluated at the point x provided in X. The subroutine must not change X.

2.2 Use of common and printing

Any printed output from TSO1A/AD is written to unit number LP, where the common variable LP is set to 6 automatically by a BLOCK DATA subprogram. This method is used in order that the destination of the output can be changed by the calling program by reference to the common block

The single precision version

COMMON/TS01B/ LP

The double precision version

COMMON/TS01BD/ LP

2.3 Requesting relative accuracy

To obtain an approximation based on relative accuracy rather than absolute accuracy a different entry to TS01 must be called.

The single precision version

CALL TS01C(A,B,ACC,RELACC,MAXFUN,N,XN,FN,GN,IPRINT,W,CALCFX)

The double precision version

CALL TS01CD(A, B, ACC, RELACC, MAXFUN, N, XN, FN, GN, IPRINT, W, CALCFX)

All the arguments except ACC and RELACC are as described for TS01A/AD.

The approximation S(x) is calculated to satisfy the inequality

 $|f(x) - S(x)| \le \max\{ \text{ACC}, \text{RELACC}^*|f(x)| \}, \quad a \le x \le b,$

The arguments ACC and RELACC defined in this expression must both be set to positive values by the user of the subroutine. In this case the value of ACC is changed to the predicted value of the quantity

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$$\max_{a \le x \le b} \left\{ \min \left[|f(x) - S(x)|, \left| \frac{f(x) - S(x)}{f(x)} \right| \times \frac{\text{ACC}}{\text{RELACC}} \right] \right\}$$

so again ACC is increased if and only if the requested accuracy is not satisfied according to the tests of the subroutine. The value of RELACC is not altered.

3 GENERAL INFORMATION

Workspace: see argument W.

Use of common: a common block TS01B/BD is used, see §2.2.

Other routines called directly: a user supplied subroutine is called to evaluate f(x), see argument CALCFX.

Input/output: see argument IPRINT and §2.2.

4 METHOD

The method is described in detail in Harwell report R-7308 by M.J.D. Powell. Because tridiagonal matrices occur in the calculation of S(x), the subroutine operations of TS01 are so fast that usually the time spent in TS01 is insignificant compared with the time spent in the subroutine CALCFX that calculates f(x). Most applications require fewer than 100 evaluations of f(x).
